Patient Welfare, Therapist Responsibility: Legal and Ethical Considerations

Participants will learn to deal with ethical dilemmas such as (1) when therapist values conflict with patient values (highlighting two precedent setting legal cases), (2) current trends in disciplinary process and ethical violations, (3) using risk management techniques to solve ethical dilemmas, (4) current ethical standard of care in the world of technology, reputation protection, Skype, texting, social media and HIPAA compliance, (5) background history and current updates related to the APA allegedly conspiring to participate in "torture" techniques after 9/11. Literature updates, along with relevant Codes of Ethics and current expert opinion will be included in all areas of discussion. This program overviews the current research findings and knowledge that inform the practice of ethical and legal practice.

Clinical architect of the Claudia Black Young Adult Center at The Meadows. She works with their team assessing and enhancing the quality of the program. She is a Senior Fellow and a clinical consultant at The Meadows Treatment Center in Arizona since 1998. Her seminal work with children impacted by substance abuse in the late 1970s created the foundation for the adult child movement. Renowned author of over 15 books and a trainer internationally recognized for her pioneering and contemporary work with family systems and addictive disorders. She sits on the Advisory Board for the National Association for Children of Alcoholics and the Advisory Council of the Moyer Foundation.

Working with the young adult with addictive disorders most often also means working with cooccurring disorders of anxiety and depression. This presentation will focus on the dynamics of underlying trauma that fuels these disorders. Recognizing not just blatant traumas, but addressing developmental trauma is significant in their treatment. Claudia will conclude addressing treatment protocol that recognizes the development needs of this age group differ from their older counterparts.

Don Meichenbaum, PhD

Some 6% to 10% of youth identify themselves as LGBTQ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and questioning). Some 70% of these youth report being harassed or bullied with a consequence of increased likelihood of missing school, dropping out and with the tragic result of double the suicide rate. This presentation will consider specific ways to bolster resilience on a preventative basis and what clinicians, educators, peers and parents can do to address these challenges.

She holds a Master of Arts Degree in Counseling Psychology and Expressive Arts Therapy from Prescott College in Arizona. Ashley has completed Pia Mellody's Post Induction Training and Experiential Training from Onsite. Ashley's passions are finding new and creative ways to help families reach a deeper level of consciousness about their individual roles in their unique family system. Her other areas of training include Expressive Arts Therapy, Auricular Acupuncture, and Sensorimotor Psychotherapy.



Patricia Plum, MSW, LMSW

Family Therapist for the Claudia Black Young Adult Center. She holds a Master's Degree in Social Work from Arizona State University. Prior to working as a Family Therapist with The Claudia Black Young Adult Center, Patricia worked in an outpatient addiction clinic, serving in both a private and group setting. Her other areas of training include: Post Induction Therapy, Experiential Therapy, Auricular Acupuncture Therapy and DeHp Therapy. Patricia's passion lies in helping to bring education, collaboration, and insight to families, to encourage healing and hope.



The Claudia Black Family team will engage participants in an experiential role play exploring the dynamics of a family system moving from trauma and addiction into relapse or recovery. Families entering into early recovery from trauma and addiction quite often struggle with the ability to see and understand how their current family roles and behaviors impact the health of the family system. Offering the client an experiential enables a person and the family system to gain greater insights and emotional connection to the possibilities of health or dysfunction in the future. The presenters will discuss the adaptation of this model of work to other experiential modalities.



The **Claudia Black Young Adult Center** provides intensive, experientially based inpatient treatment specifically tailored to young adults ages 18 to 26 who are struggling with unresolved emotional trauma, addictions, or who have a dual diagnosis. The Opioid Epidemic: Adolescent & Young Adult Issues

David Smith, MD, FASAM, FAACT

Recognized as a national leader in the pharmacology and treatment of addictive disease, Dr. Smith is Founder and Medical Director of Haight-Ashbury Free Clinics in San Francisco, and Past President of the American Society of Addiction Medicine. He is currently Chair of Addiction Medicine for Muir Wood Adolescent & Family Services in Petaluma, CA and Consulting Physician for North Bay Recovery Center in San Rafael.



Prescription opioid abuse and heroin addiction are a growing concern in adolescents and young adults. Recent observations suggest that early recognition of and action on youth substance abuse issues are critical to brain health. Medical system interventions, e.g. SBIRT, are an important factor in this process.

Various ways to involve parents in the treatment of adolescents will be considered focusing on parent adolescent conflict, substance abuse and other forms of comorbidity. How to implement the core tasks of psychotherapy will be discussed.



Working with Young Men: How to Integrate Mindfulness with Trauma and Addiction Treatment Christopher Dorval LCDP, LCDCS

Chris is a Licensed Chemical Dependency Clinical Supervisor and has a Master's degree in Clinical Social Work. He is the Program Manager of Clinical Services of Rhode Island at Greenville, RI. He is currently working with Griffin Recovery Enterprises as a consultant specializing in treating males, trauma and addiction. A person in recovery himself, Chris is passionate about working with men affected by addiction and trauma and has dedicated his practice to this focus.



Our society has often turned a blind eye to trauma's impact on males focusing on trauma as a "female issue." Mindfulness has been shown to be effective with females but there has been limited research with male populations. Using evidenced based research and case examples from clinical practice this presentation will offer a look at integrating mindfulness as a clinical intervention with traumatized young men in addiction treatment.

Resilience and the Healing Power of Story

Kathleen Parrish, MA, LPC

Clinical Director of Cottonwood Tucson, an internationally renowned, residential treatment program for co-occurring disorders in Tucson, Arizona. She holds a Master of Arts degree in Marriage and Family Therapy and an MA in Religious Education. Kathleen has worked in private practice, outpatient treatment, and residential treatment settings and has worked with trauma survivors for over 20 years, focusing on story, mindfulness, and self-compassion. She has written articles for Counselor, Addiction Professional, Addiction Today and Arizona Together magazines. She has presented seminars on trauma and eating disorder in the United States and Europe.



Tanya Lauer, MC, LPC

Holds a Master's Degree in psychotherapy and counseling and has over twenty years working in trauma healing in various settings including outpatient trauma centers, psychiatric hospitals, inpatient treatment centers. Tanya currently works as a trauma specialist at Cottonwood Tucson. She has presented at conferences and facilitated workshops in the United States and Europe. She believes in the importance of developing narrative, mindfulness and self-compassion as essential skills for supporting trauma resolution and emphasizes the need for integration and the mind body connection in her work.



Many clients suffer from the effects of trauma and PTSD. At any age, PTSD can also co-occur with many other problems, including depression, low self-esteem, substance use disorders, struggles with interpersonal relationships and self-harm behavior. Clinicians must understand the underlying negative beliefs that often complicate trauma recovery in clients. This workshop will review recent changes to diagnostic criteria for PTSD and will examine evidenced-based interventions in the treatment of trauma. Further, it will provide strategies to support trauma survivors in telling and transforming their story as they reclaim personal identity and integrity.



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How to Connect with Teens and Start the Conversation Regarding Critical Issues

Mendi Baron, LCSW

CEO and founder of Evolve Treatment Centers and is a teen advocate and expert on how to start the conversation on critical issues that impact today's teens. Before launching Evolve Treatment Centers, Mendi conceived and built, from the ground up, successful, high end adolescent residential and outpatient programs in Los Angeles. The son of a Rabbi, eldest of 11 children, he is a part-time rock musician, cantor, and father of two.



The presentation demonstrates how to start the conversation and connect with teens to explore critical issues during various phases leading up to, during, and following the treatment process including education, aspirations, spirituality, and life development.

Recognized for her pioneering work on alcohol and tobacco advertising and the image of women in advertising. Author of Can't Buy My Love: How Advertising Changes the Way We Think and Feel which won the Distinguished Publication Award from the Association for Women in Psychology in 2000 and So Sexy So Soon: The New Sexualized Childhood and What Parents Can Do To Protect Their Kids. Internationally recognized clinical social worker, clinical psychologist, and chemical dependency treatment specialist with well over 30 years of experience. He is the author of 29 books and numerous articles in the mental health and chemical dependency fields, featured in numerous publications and author of Treating Trauma in Children and Adults, Personality Disorders, and Understanding Self-Injury.

Adolescence is a time of developmental change which effects choice and decision-making, judgment and insight. Given the structure of the brain coupled with the acting out behaviors, testing and generally often hedonistic tendencies of adolescence, substance use, behavioral addictions and other pathological states tend to put adolescents at greater risk. Skills in both the mental health and the substance abuse areas are required to be able to successfully navigate the treatment arena of dual diagnosed clients. Systems issues, program design, clinician orientation and client motivation all play a significant part in treatment.

Integrative Treatment of Complex Trauma for Adolescents and Young Adults (ITCT-A)

John Briere, PhD

ITCT-A is an empirically-validated treatment for multiply traumatized, multi-problem adolescents and young adults. This innovative approach includes relational, cognitive—behavioral, affect regulation, and mindfulness



components that are specifically crafted to engage and assist seriously traumatized—and sometimes alienated—young people. Grounded in the real world of clinical practice, but informed by cutting-edge behavioral science, it offers a flexible, nonjudgmental, but focused approach to posttraumatic stress, and issues such as substance abuse, tension reduction behaviors (e.g., self-mutilation, "acting out"), and dysfunctional sexual behavior.

Let's Get Going! How to Intervene, Engage and Retain Young Adults and Their Families

Reinhard Straub, LICSW, LCDCS

A Licensed Independent Clinical Social Worker and a Licensed Chemical Dependency Clinical Supervisor. He has worked in the Substance Abuse and Mental Health field for 27 years and has conducted over 1,000 clinical interventions. In 2011 Reinhard founded Clinical Services of Rhode Island, a system of 3 licensed substance abuse outpatient facilities, and is the Clinical & Business Development Liaison for American Addiction Centers.

Recent research indicates that there is a direct connection and potential progression in the etiological development of the Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorders with the Oppositional Defiant and the Conduct Disorder. Often



a source of etiological confusion, clinicians often find themselves thinking too linearly that clients have only one of these disorders but not accounting for the comorbidity of disorders. These disorders often lead to a life of substance abuse, self-medication, bullying, incarceration and tragedy. Systems are often overloaded and unable to provide the level of intervention necessary and these individuals often get labeled as "bad people" instead of sick people. This seminar offers practical "how to" information and interventions.

Integrating Multi-dimensional Family Therapy with Adolescents in a Residential Treatment Setting

Although our culture teaches us to avoid "negative" experience, Buddhist and Western psychologies agree that avoiding pain leads to long-term suffering, whereas engaging pain ultimately reduces it. In this way, ongoing traumarelated distress represents access to experiences that can be cognitively,



emotionally, and existentially processed. Work with this paradox offers clients the opportunity to change their relationship to the past, thereby decreasing its power over their lives.

Self-injury is more than a maladaptive coping mechanism; it acts like a drug and can be as addictive as any drug of abuse. John Arden. PhD



Author of 14 books, including Brain2Brain, The Brain Bible, Rewire Your Brain, and Brain-Based Therapy with Adults and Brain-Based Therapy with Children and Adolescents (with Lloyd Linford). He serves as Director of Training in Mental Health for Kaiser Permanente in the Northern California region where he oversees the training programs in 24 medical centers where over 130 postdoctoral residents and interns are trained each year. He also provides individual and group therapy through Kaiser Permanente. He presents workshops on brain-based therapy internationally and in the U.S.

This keynote presents information on how Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) can present challenges for adolescents with the maturation of the prefrontal cortex. Therapy with adolescents requires engagement of and care for the adolescent's prefrontal cortex. Therapy with adolescents' requires a mind brain changing process that transforms dysregulation to the re-regulation of mood, cognition, and behaviors.
