Opening Scientific Plenary & R. Brinkley Smithers Distinguished Scientist Award and Lecture

ASAM will honor Joseph Westermeyer, MD, PhD, MPH – this year's recipient of the R. Brinkley Smithers Distinguished Scientist Award. Dr. Westermeyer is being recognized for his continuing support of ASAM and his crucial role in guiding alcohol research in America. Following presentation of the Award, Dr. Westermeyer will deliver his lecture, **"Symmetry and Asymmetry in Addiction Medicine: The Balance Between You, Your Patient, and Your Setting**," in which he will argue that symmetry in clinician-patient and clinician-funder interactions supports patients' recoveries, while keeping the physician safe and sane.

As Professor of Psychiatry and Adjunct Professor of Anthropology at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, Dr. Westermeyer is also a staff psychiatrist and Medical Director of the Addictive Disorders Service at the Minneapolis VA Medical Center.



In addition to his clinical practice at the Minneapolis VA Hospital, Dr. Westermeyer maintains an active research program, focusing on cross-cultural mental health issues. He has published over 100 articles, and he currently is on the editorial boards of several journals. (See page 12 for details.)

US Drug Crisis—The Addiction Treatment Gap

H. Westley Clark, MD, JD, MPH, CAS, FASAM, will explore the Administration's efforts to address the addiction treatment gap in this country and the ways that physicians can work with federal partners like the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to expand access to treatment. Dr. Clark and a panel of policy experts will also discuss the agency's efforts to expand access to treatment and the addiction treatment workforce, particularly in light of the expansion of benefits under the Affordable Care Act.



As Director of the Center for Substance Abuse

Treatment, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, he leads the agency's national effort to provide effective and accessible treatment to all Americans with addictive disorders. Dr. Clark is a noted author and educator in substance abuse treatment, anger and pain management, psychopharmacology, and medical and legal issues.

ASAM's Annual Public Policy Plenary explores federal and state public policies that affect the research, education, prevention and treatment efforts of addiction medicine practitioners. Attendees will gain a more intimate understanding of the practical implications of these policies on their work and on the lives of their colleagues, patients, and students. 2013 Ruth Fox Course for Physicians: Trauma & Addiction

Thursday, April 25, 8:00 am - 5:30 pm

The Ruth Fox Course for Physicians, dedicated to the memory of Founding President of ASAM, Ruth Fox, MD, began in 1980. Now in its 32nd year, the course has educated thousands of physicians, and is dedicated to providing practicing physicians with current trends in the field of addiction medicine. It offers new directions and concepts in clinical practice and updates in selected areas of research and practical application.

This year's Ruth Fox Course will focus on trauma and addiction. Presentations will review the many different forms of trauma-adolescent, sexual, PTSD, TBI, as well as psychiatric comorbidities. In addition, the course will explore neuropsychiatric imaging as it relates to addiction, TBI and other disorders. A presentation on trauma and addiction in the military will reveal some of the most recent findings on this timely topic.

Dynamic evidence-based presentations will be presented in a lecture format with slides and handouts. Learning will be enhanced by an interactive, case-based approach and a lively question and answer period will end the day-long exploration of trauma and addiction utilizing audience response technology.

Pain & Addiction Course: Common Threads XIV — "When Opiates Fail"

Thursday, April 25, 8:00 am - 5:30 pm

FDA statistics indicate that more than 33 million Americans, teens and older, misused extended-release and long-acting (ER/LA) opioids during 2007, up from 29 million in 2002. Yet these drugs have long been a major tool in the management of chronic pain or to help those who suffer from a painful injury or surgery. Highly effective yet highly addictive, the challenge posed by ER/LA opioids—patient assessment, prescribing guidelines, managing treatment and addressing alternatives when opiates fail—is the central issue of this year's Pain & Addiction Course: Common Threads XIV.

In response to the growing epidemic of opiate abuse the FDA mandated, in July of 2012, new safety measures for ER/LA opioid medications. These measures emphasize education for prescribers and patients under the umbrella of a risk evaluation and mitigation strategy or REMS. The first half of this year's Pain and Addiction Course will provide REMS training following the FDA blueprint with specific reference to those who specialize in addiction medicine. ASAM is a partner of the Collaboration for REMS Education (CO*RE) and CO*RE recently received approval from the REMS Program Committee for its national initiative.

In the afternoon sessions, experts in neuroscience, pain management and addiction medicine will discuss ER/LA opioid function, both general and specific properties of the various opioid products as well as new treatment technologies and complementary and alternative medicine approaches to pain management "when opiates fail."

Utilizing dynamic media presentation tools, this critical content will be presented through a variety of formats including lecture, panel discussion, and interactive audience response technology.

- Understand the range of complementary and alternative modalities in the treatment of pain.

Symmetry and Asymmetry in Addiction Medicine: The Balance Between You, Your Patient, and Your Setting" Joseph Westermeyer, MD, MPH, PhD

ASAM will honor Joseph Westermeyer, MD, PhD, MPH--this year's recipient of the R. Brinkley Smithers Distinguished Scientist Award. Dr. Westermeyer is being recognized for his continuing support of ASAM and his crucial role in guiding alcohol research in America.

Following presentation of the Award, Dr. Westermeyer will deliver his lecture, "Symmetry and Asymmetry in Addiction Medicine: The Balance Between You, Your Patient, and Your Setting," in which he will argue that symmetry in clinician-patient and clinician-funder interactions supports patients' recov-



eries, while keeping the physician safe and sane. Asymmetric interactions, on the other hand, undermine relationships, can damage or impede recovery, and confuse or disturb the clinician. Beginning with the concepts originated by Martin Buber, Eric Berne, and E. Morton Jellinek, Dr. Westermeyer will explore methods for (1) recognizing symmetry and asymmetry in the care of addicted patients and (2) tactics and strategies for changing asymmetric relations to symmetry.

He will also discuss the experience of symmetric or asymmetric relationships with those who hire or fund us. Most common types of asymmetry are readily recognized. However, large third-party funders have begun displacing clinician-driven care (e.g., guided by the ASAM Criteria). Although these programmatic changes are often simple, well meaning, and based in one or another theory, their outcomes are often complex and unpredictable.

Finally, Dr. Westermeyer will underscore the inherent link in the symmetry with the patient and the symmetry with the funder. If these two relationships with the clinician do not coalesce, asymmetry defeats therapeutic goals and drains morale.

As Professor of Psychiatry and Adjunct Professor of Anthropology at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, Dr. Westermeyer is also a staff psychiatrist and Medical Director of the Addictive Disorders Service at the Minneapolis VA Medical Center.

In addition to his clinical practice at the Minneapolis VA Hospital, Dr. Westermeyer maintains an active research program, focusing on cross-cultural mental health issues. He has published over 100 articles, and he currently is on the editorial boards of several journals, including the American Journal of Drug and Alcohol Abuse, American Indian Alaska Native Mental Health Research, and World Cultural Psychiatry Research Review.

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAM-HSA) reports that over 20 million Americans aged 12 and older were classified with substance dependence or abuse in the last year and nearly 17 million Americans were classified with alcohol dependence or abuse. Barely four million received treatment. The gap between need and treatment is wide and it is not improving.

H. Westley Clark, MD, JD, MPH, CAS, FASAM will explore the Administration's efforts to address the addiction treatment gap in this country and the

ways that physicians can work with federal partners like SAMHSA to expand access to treatment. Dr. Clark and a panel of policy experts will also discuss the addiction treatment workforce, particularly in light of the expansion of benefits under the Affordable Care Act.

As Director of the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment at SAMHSA, Dr. Clark he leads the agency's national effort to provide effective and accessible treatment to all Americans with addictive disorders. Dr. Clark is a noted author and educator in substance abuse treatment. anger and pain management, psychopharmacology, and medical and legal issues.

All Active Membership Categories (other than Retired) must maintain a valid active allopathic or osteopathic medical license or certification of residency, fellowship, or student status. A valid active medical license is one issued by the appropriate agency and certifies that a physician is permitted to practice medicine within that country, province, or state. ASAM considers a medical license to be valid where stipulations and/or conditions have been placed on the license. The society shall not consider a license to be valid if it has been revoked, suspended, surrendered, or made subject to a sanction similar or equivalent to revocation, suspension, or surrender until such time as 1) the physician has notified ASAM that the sanction has expired or been removed, and 2) ASAM has confirmed the expiration or removal of the sanction with the state licensing board. These provisions shall apply equally to all licenses held by a physician. All active members shall submit the required dues and license certification at the time of joining or forfeit membership.

- □ Regular \$455 Licensed to practice allopathic or osteopathic medicine in the US.
- □ Early Career Physicians* \$235 Physicians in their first two years after completing an accredited Residency or Fellowship program OR in the first two years of practicing addiction medicine on a full time basis.
- □ International \$300 Reside or work outside the US or its territories; must maintain valid medical license in their country or province.
- □ Retired \$140 Completely retired from the practice of medicine or osteopathy.
- □ Resident \$35 Interns, residents, or fellows serving in an approved hospital or fellowship program. Must have a valid license in localities where required or an equivalent certifying document.
- □ Med Student* \$0 Enrolled and in good standing in formally accredited allopathic or osteopathic medical schools. *Students must submit a certifying letter from their school or the contact information for the dean of the schoool with their application.*
